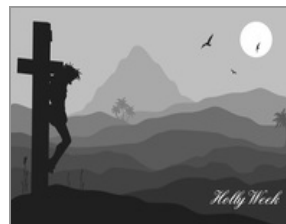

FOOD4KIDS

The Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) is a federally funded child nutrition program whose goal is to feed hungry children and teens ages 1-18 during the summer months when they do not have access to free/reduced school meals. *Food4Kids*, a ministry of The Church of the Holy Spirit, Orleans (supported by several Nauset Interfaith congregations, including St. Joan of Arc's St. Vincent De Paul conference) is the only SFSP sponsor on the lower/outer Cape. By partnering with more than 16 different sponsored programs from Harwich to Provincetown, we are able to distribute lunches and snacks to 400-500 children each day 9 weeks in the summer. We make and distribute those meals with a very small paid staff and the generous efforts of more than 100 volunteers. We also distribute several thousand quality children's books.

Childhood hunger is a hidden reality on Cape Cod. 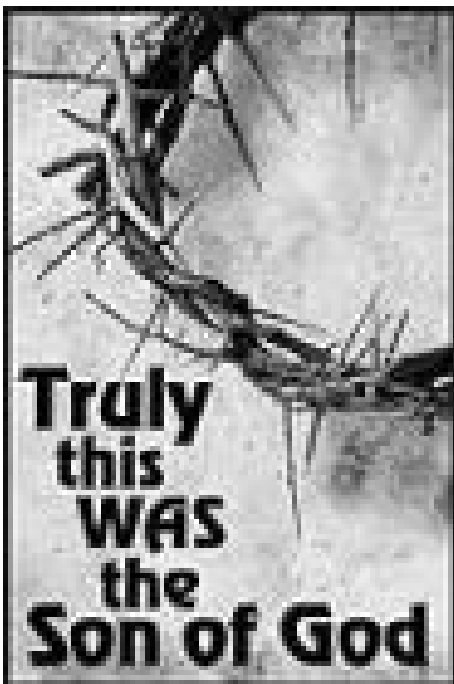

WHEN DOES OUR HOPE DIE?

Palm Sunday begins the week we call *Holy Week*. The palms, gathered from the “kingly” palm trees surrounding Jerusalem, symbolize royal status. They are joyfully waved and spread before the donkey that carries Jesus into Jerusalem. But the crowd is fickle and easily swayed—by Friday they are jeering and shouting for his death. How quickly we move through the scenes of the week: the intimacy of the *foot washing*; the *gift of bread*—blest; broken; shared—at the Last Supper; the *agonizing hours* in the Garden; the brutal night of interrogation; the *torturous journey* to the destination of death. How is one to cope with it all? Who wouldn’t run away or deny any knowledge of this man, Jesus? Who wouldn’t lose hope?

The question doesn’t stop at Calvary—it echoes in our world today. We welcome the hope Jesus brings when we experience healing; forgiveness; love. So when is it that we drop our palm branches and walk away? When does our hope die?

Is it when Jesus asks us to partner with him in sharing the pain of the cross? When he insists that we detach from possessions, and give more generously? When we are shown the way of non-violence; non-judgment; and non-prejudice? Is it when Jesus urges us out of our “tombs” of self-righteousness to see that even our enemies are held within his field of grace— that no one is excluded?

Do we walk away when the going gets tough, or distance ourselves when Jesus doesn’t seem to be “coming through” for us. Perhaps, Jesus is someone we can admire from a distance, but to get really close to him might prove too costly.

It is precisely here in the darkness of our fears—in our blindness and ignorance—that Jesus illumines our path. He walks with us in the midst of the very doubts and struggles that cause us to give up hope. He transforms our hearts and re-ignites our spirits in his all-embracing love. This is the God who yearns for all creation to “*come alive*”— to be co-creators of a new world—his kingdom of justice and peace.

As we welcome the *Christ of victory* with palm branches, may we also welcome the *Christ of suffering*—*The Suffering Servant*, who humbly embraces our humanity and walks with us in our own pain. It is here that we find the hope that refuses to die, and the courage to ‘*suffer with*’ one another in life-giving ways. May this Holy Week be one of healing and hope for each of us and for our suffering world.
