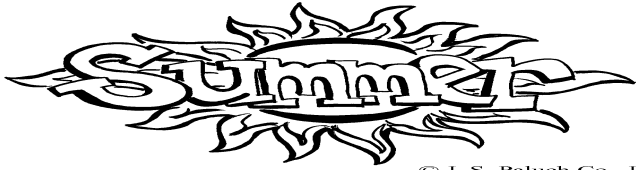

MAY WE BECOME WHAT WE RECEIVE

What are you doing for dinner tonight? Will there be time to sit down and enjoy a meal as a family, or will your schedules require an ‘eat-and-run’? Perhaps the grill will be fired up on the patio, or maybe you’ll be making your way to your favorite restaurant. In her book *Beginner’s Grace: Bringing Prayer to Life*, author Kate Braestrup offers this explanation:

“For the people of the ancient world, bread and wine were the most common of foods—indeed, often the only items consumed—bread and wine for breakfast, bread and wine for lunch, bread and wine for dinner, and bread and wine as the basis and filler for all feasts. Bread and wine were inexpensive and ordinary. Couldn’t Jesus, God Incarnate, and therefore surely a gourmet”, writes Kate, “declare the legacy of Himself to be spices, pomegranates, meat, or figs—some rarer, more delicious thing—a delicacy more easily recognized as precious and therefore—sacred?”

Ask the poor, the hungry, the stranger in our midst: ‘Why would Jesus choose to infuse his Sacred Self into the cheapest, most ordinary, and easy-to-find food in what was then imagined to be the whole wide world?’ Why would these simple, readily available foods become the elements of such extraordinary nourishment and promise?”

Kate suggests that perhaps this *is* the point; perhaps bread was chosen precisely because Jesus chooses to nourish us in the ordinary— and in community through a common life-giving staple—a staple available to all. Like the manna consumed by the Israelites in the desert, it is nourishment freely and generously provided for all to share.

“Every morsel of food we put into our mouth,” writes Kate, *“is a blessing. Saying grace doesn’t make it into a blessing; it already is one. Holy Communion isn’t the only holy meal— It is the meal that can remind us that every meal is holy.”* In the image of simple bread, Jesus invites us to embrace our oneness—our common hunger and thirst, not just for food, but for that which is essential to feed the hunger of our spirits. We are invited to eat the bread of Christ’s Body and to drink the wine of his Blood that we might become Christ.

In the words of St. Teresa of Avila: *Christ has no body now but ours; no hands, but ours; no feet but ours. Ours are the eyes through which Christ’s compassion looks out into the world.*” May we become what we receive: the Body and Blood of Christ!
