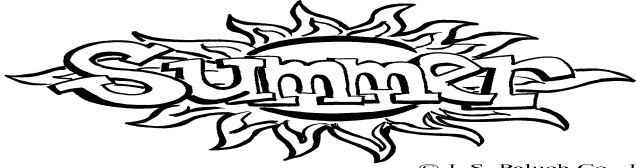

THE LITTLE PROPHET

You may recall that several years ago Haiti suffered a deadly earthquake. A young woman oncologist, as reported by *The Boston Globe*, was a part of a group of doctors from Boston who went to offer help. She told of being totally overwhelmed by the situation in a very primitive tent hospital. There was a seemingly endless barrage of impossible medical traumas, and they were without proper medicines or instruments. At one point, she became so paralyzed by her helplessness and fear, that unable to function any longer, she buried her face in her hands and began sobbing uncontrollably.

She was at the bedside of a little boy, whose leg had been amputated a few days earlier. The little boy, not any older than 6 or 7, saw her tears and her trembling. With a smile, he lifted his head from his pillow and encouraged her to move on to some other kids whom he “knew” needed her attention more than he did.

Remarkably, she found she was able to do so. For in that moment, the power of death and her overwhelming sense of horror and hopelessness were broken open. She had witnessed in that little boy the triumph of love over pain and fear.

In his generosity of heart and compassion of spirit, this little boy is the kind of “prophet” Jesus calls us all to be. Without realizing it, he was helping to realize the kingdom of God more fully in the here and now—even in the midst of unbearable suffering.

In *The Joy of the Gospel* Francis recalls that at Jesus’ birth angels bring the shepherds news of great joy that is for all people. The world is transformed through love and healing, through walking with those in need and struggle; through allowing ourselves to be broken open so that we might witness to the triumph of love over pain and fear.

For what is it that we really have to fear? The Gospel reminds us so beautifully in the language of Jesus’ time: *Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground apart from your Father...do not be afraid, you are of more value than many sparrows!* Clearly the little boy in the tent hospital somehow grasped this message—may we, too, allow love to shine through our fears and our pain that we might be bring Christ’s healing to the world.
