## SOLAR PANEL PROJECT

As you may know, our Solar Panel Project was recently approved by the Town of Orleans' Architectural Commission. This means that E2 Solar has now been granted the permit, and work can finally begin on the project, weather permitting.

I am extremely grateful to our Solar Panel Committee for all the work they did over the past six months to bring us to this point. They certainly "did their homework" and helped us make all the decisions we had to make regarding the project.

I am also grateful to the Diocese of Fall River for their legal help with contract wording, and their financial analysis of the project, which confirmed the decisions our committee had made, including the decision to purchase the Solar Panel System, rather than lease it.

Our goal with this project is twofold. We are striving to do what is best, both for the parish, and for the environment. This is the mindset we have held throughout our planning of the Solar Panel Project.

As far as the parish is concerned, this project should stabilize our parish finances as it will save us \$20,000 to \$30,000 per year. As far as the environment is concerned, producing clean energy is a noteworthy response to Pope Francis' call to care for our environment.

Our Solar Panel System will be a 70,560 watt system and will consist of 196 panels on the south facing roof of the church. At 360 watts, the Sun Power Solar Panels are the highest performing solar panels currently on the market. The other panels we considered were either 290, 310, or 320 watts.

The Sun Power Solar Panels also have a 25-year warranty, rather than the standard 20-year warranty. Their degradation over time is also substantially less than other panels, as they are projected to be operating at 93% efficiency at the end of the 25-year warranty period. Other panels we considered were projected to be operating at 86-87% efficiency at the end of a 20-year warranty. All of this means that we are making maximum use of our available south-facing roof space, while fully benefiting from the Solar Panel System since we will own it.

The total cost of the Solar Panel Project, because we are purchasing, and not leasing, and because we are using such premium panels is expensive — \$218,619.00!

This is why I am so grateful to all who have already made their annual appeal donation, resulting in a total of \$91,829 to date. If you have not yet contributed, please know that there is still time to donate to our Annual Appeal in support of our Solar Panel Project. Thank you very much!

## **BRIDGES OF HOPE**

Recently Thomas Farragher wrote an article for the Boston Globe which describes an island of refuge off Mystic, Connecticut. Ender's Island is reached by a tiny one-lane bridge – a passage of a life-time for teens and young adults whose lives have been wrecked by drugs and alcohol – who have left behind a trail of betrayal and defeat, of hopelessness and paralyzing fear. On the other side of the bridge they are met by Father Thomas Hoar who always asks the same question: *“Have you had enough?”*

A much younger Father Hoar – acting in his role as the fire department chaplain on duty – was confronted with that same question by the Fire Chief, a long time ago. Father Hoar recalls his humiliation and his realization that he was living a ‘double life’ – a life that he thought was well-disguised – but which he now knew was obvious to others. After his first denials and rationalizations, Father Tom looked himself in the mirror and repeated the question: *“Have you had enough?”*

It was then that he set out to serve those in recovery. Ender's Island became a recovery residence – a haven of hope – for college-aged men who typically stay for up to 12 months of post-treatment recovery and counseling, education and job training. More than 70% – a remarkable figure – are raised out of the carnage of opioid and alcohol addiction to go on to lead productive lives in sobriety.

In today's Gospel Jesus grasped the hand of Simon's mother-in-law and “helped her up”. In the original text the word *diakoneo* was used which literally means: *“he raised her up.”* The woman responded “by waiting” on them – literally meaning *“she served him”*. The familiar term Deacon is derived from this Greek the word *diakoneo* – *one who is raised up to serve.*

This moment in Mark's Gospel mirrors the dynamic between God and us: God “raises us up” out of our own despair and illness and hardships, enabling us to make similar miracles of hope happen in our “service” of compassion and healing to others. Through the mercy and peace we experience, we can become *“bridges of hope”* like Father Hoar on Ender's Island, enabling others to walk in the light and grace of God
