LOVE ONE ANOTHER

It seems that we cannot get enough of love stories. There is a certain kind of magic about them that draws us in and touches the heart. Dr. Seuss explains why love stories are so compelling when he says: *'You know you're in love when you can't fall asleep because reality is finally better than your dreams!'* St. Paul deepens this understanding of love when he says: *'Love believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things...the greatest of these is love'* (1Cor.13:7-13). Yes, it seems we cannot get enough of love stories, but can we *'live'* love in the challenges of daily life – can we *'live'* love when those close to us suffer; can we *live* love with those whose opinions may not be ours; can we *'live'* love in the demanding ways in which Jesus calls us to love in today's Gospel?

Perhaps the following story from *Maryknoll Magazine* can give love some practical perspective, and help us see past the romanticism that often surrounds the concept of love:

An American visitor stopped by the home of a friend in Tanzania. The friend and three neighbors were engrossed in a game of Scrabble. The visitor asked who was winning. They replied that they didn't know and weren't keeping score. In fact, they were helping each other come up with higher-scoring words – and even using a dictionary! "What about the rules?" the visitor asked.

The players explained that they weren't interested in beating each other – only in beating the combined total scores of their previous games. They were playing for community gain, not individual honors. Playing this way, they explained, helped them all to learn new words in English, which was their third and fourth language.

This *'everyone-wins'* Scrabble game is the ideal of Jesus' message to his friends gathered at the table with him the night before he died. The love that Christ asks of us finds its source in the heart and spirit, not in whatever rules we establish; not in our own need to win – especially when our winning means that someone else loses.

Loving as Christ has loved us begins by putting aside our own hopes and wants to realize, instead, the hopes and wants of others. This understanding of love calls for humility and the willingness to sacrifice for the good of the whole. The Gospel calls us to realize the power of resurrection which springs from making the first move to forgive and to heal; from embracing Christ's spirit of love in our attitudes and relationships. This kind of love is not only compelling but transformative
