## SOLAR PANELS

In the recent Annual Appeal Letter, I stated that we hope to put solar panels on the south facing roof of the church NEXT year. Over the past few months, I have been meeting with a small committee of well qualified parishioners about this project. I have also consulted several churches who already have solar panels, and have obtained the support of the Diocese for the project.

With the most recent information our committee has gathered, we have determined that it would be MOST beneficial for the parish to **complete a solar panel project BEFORE March 31, 2018**. AFTER March 31, 2018, Massachusetts State Law changes regarding the value of Solar Renewable Energy Credits (or SREC'S). This means that the income we will receive for being a clean energy producer will be substantially LESS than it would be if our system is "Mechanically Complete" by March 31st.

After looking into FIVE solar companies, and receiving bids from four of them, we have selected E2 Solar out of Dennis, MA to design and install our solar panel system. E2 Solar has visited our site, and they SHOULD complete the design of our solar panel system shortly. Then, Eversource must APPROVE the design of the system before the project can move forward. By law, Eversource has up to 45 business days to approve the system.

Please know that **your contribution to THIS year's Parish Annual Appeal WILL support our Solar Panel Project**, as well as the other projects outlined in the Annual Appeal Letter. We strongly believe that producing clean energy is a great response to Pope Francis' call to care for our environment, and we KNOW that a solar panel system will virtually eliminate our \$20,000 - \$30,000 electric bill from our three parish buildings.

## **THE POWER OF POWER**

We've all heard statements like: *Power corrupts; don't give away your power; the abuse of power is the root of all evil; he/she is a power-monger; power opens doors.* Today Jesus brings us face-to-face with the good use of power – power directed by loving action – as compared to its opposite – the imposition of demands that are burdensome, hypocritical, and unjust. Good use of power involves a new kind of language – the language that protects children, the poor, the hungry, the irrelevant. It is the language that moves us from domination to transformation. The following news story from the *Washington Post* shows the powerfully transformative quality of *power*:

*A young girl had been absent from class. At a parent conference the mother told the teacher that her daughter had been hospitalized. Then, prompted by the teacher's genuine concern, the Mom spoke about the daughter's attempted suicide – shocking news, considering the lovely and friendly outward appearance of this young student.*

*The teacher wrote a letter to the girl, delivered by the mother. The hand-written note praised the girl's academic achievements, her warm personality, her friendship to so many. It told how much she was missed and that her classmates were looking forward to her return. The few simple lines contained a power she never expected. The note was the turning point in the girl's recovery – the young girl hadn't thought that anyone would ever miss her if she was gone!*

*Surprised at the impact of this little note, the teacher began writing a card to every one of her 130 students. She pointed out a particular talent she had noticed, or a unique character trait, or the difference the person's presence made to the good of the whole class. She couldn't believe the immediate reactions from "cool" high school students: smiles, hugs, sharing – a feeling of belonging – the formation of a community.*

*When interviewed, the teacher said that the whole incident had made her realize how vulnerable we all are – how we never really know the burdens someone else is carrying – how, as a teacher, she could perhaps use her small sphere of power to influence her students for the good. The teacher's insightful action speaks of the power of transformation rather than domination.*

To follow Jesus is to act with compassion rather than judgment; to walk-the-walk and not merely to talk-the-talk; to use the power of kindness rather than harshness, censure, or domination. May we humbly use our power, however limited it may seem, for the transformation and good of all.
